

### School Gossip.

We break up this year on the 26th of July, and resume work in the beginning of October.

Professor Strong of Liverpool examined our School on the 13th, and Professor Steggall of Dundee on the 17th of July.

The following have kindly presented books to the Library:—The Rector, Mr. Stewart, Smith i, Smith ii, Miller i, Gibson i, and Heys. They have our best thanks.

We are glad to observe that Rev. W. R. Macray's book on Latin Syntax has already entered on a second edition.

We have to thank the United Asbestos Company, Dock House, Billiter Street, London, E.C., for specimens of Canadian and Italian Asbestos, and examples showing its use in the manufacture of packing for stuffing boxes, joints, &c.

Asbestos, as is well known, resists high temperatures without undergoing alteration, and this led to its use in gas fires. Now the more fibrous varieties are manufactured alone or in combination with rubber and similar substances into cloth, sheeting, and packing, and the ordinary substance when made into a paste is an excellent bagging or cover for boilers.

Mr. Kippen, of the editoral staff of the Dundee Advertiser, has also sent us stereo illustrating type-setting, moulding, and casting, as now performed in the offices of all daily papers. On the flat he has had, moulded and cast, a weather chart from the "Evening Telegraph," and a piece of "East of Fife" news shows the arc of the regular printing cylinder.

These interesting contributions at present occupying the cupboards of the Science Class Room, would with the Geological Specimens, &c., belonging to the School form a substantial nucleus for a small museum.

We regret that in the June issue of *The Morrisonian* we omitted to mention the names of Ex-Provost M'Gregor and Mr. Doig, as handsome subscribers to the Sports' Fund.

- G. C. STRATHAIRN—has played well in a few innings, but will not play with a straight bat. A slow fielder. A moderate short-stop.
- A. D. Thomson—runs away and does not always play with a straight bat. Has played a useful innings now and then. A fast and erratic bowler. A fair fielder.
- J. GIBB—can play with style if he takes the trouble, but slackness spoils both his batting and fielding.
- J. CAPPELL—A poor batsman, because he does not play with a straight bat. A fair bowler and a moderate field. Has not been able to play much.

- O. Sellors—plays back too much when he ought to make the most of his reach. A slow fielder.
- J. H. WYLIE—His best point is his sharp fielding, and many would do well to take an example from him. A weak bat, but perseveres.
- T. H. Wood—A good-length bowler. A poor batsman, and a bad fielder.
- F. W. HEYS—tries to play but is not very successful. He does his best.
- J. S. Nelson runs away too much, otherwise might make a batsman. A fair fielder.

#### RESERVES.

- T. STRATHAIRN—has got some ideas of batting, but does not play at the ball with accuracy. Can cut a ball. Too fond of jumping in front of a ball pitched on the leg-stump.
- A. C. Ballingal—A stiff but useful batsman. Is energetic in the field.

#### ACCOUNTS OF THE MATCHES.

Up to the time when this account is being written, the Morrison's Academy Cricket Club have won seven matches, lost two, and drawn two. Only one match has been stopped altogether by the weather, and that was the return match with Glenalmond 2nd XI. The first match which was played after the last issue of this Magazine, was that on June 2nd, against Dollar 2nd XI., at Dollar. Robertson and Thomson bowled well in this match, their analysis reading respectively four wickets for two runs, and three for ten. The Academy passed the Dollar total for the loss of four wickets. Gibb and Thomson played best against the grub-bowler, Beeks.

The next match was on Friday evening, June 8th, against the Former Pupils. The Academy won the toss and sent in the Former Pupils, who did not make more than twenty-four against the bowling of Mr. Auden and Griffin. The Academy went in and obtained thirty-seven for the loss of five wickets, of which Mr. Stewart made fourteen.

The XI. journeyed to Perth on June 9th to play Perth Academy. The latter went in, and, owing to the poor catching and fielding, were able to make seventy-nine. The Academy, offering no resistance to the bowling of Gardiner and Kennedy, were out for

the paltry score of forty-three.

Dollar 2nd XI. came to Crieff on June 16th. The home XI. went in first, and by the help of Strathairn i, who played a good innings of twenty-seven, reached fifty-seven. Again Robertson and Thomson came off, the former getting five wickets for four runs, and the latter three for eleven. The less said about the second innings of the home XI. the better.

The second club match was played against Auchterarder at Crieff. The Academy won the toss, but gave the visitors the innings. With the exception of Martin, who made eighteen, the visitors offered a feeble resistance to the bowling of Mr. Auden, Forbes, and Griffin, whose analysis read respectively three wickets for twelve, two for two, and four for eighteen. Mr. Mair and Mr. Stewart started to knock off the required runs. At twelve, Darling bowled Mair for six. Forbes then joined Mr. Stewart, and without any further loss passed their opponents' total. Immediately after this, however, Whyte beat Mr. Stewart who had played carefully for seventeen. Strathairn did not stay long, but when Mr. Auden partnered Forbes, runs came apace. Steele bowled Forbes, whose twentyfour was well got. Griffin came in next and stayed with Mr. Auden till time was called.

Wednesday evening, July 4th, saw the Academy playing the Crieff Merchants in the Park. In this match Mr. Stewart played a fine innings of forty-three, also Strathairn, Robertson, and Thomson played well. The


Merchants, by the help of Judge and J.Thomson, made sixty for four wickets.

The first match *versus* the Nondescripts was played on June 27th. In this match Mair played a grand innings of one hundred and six. Of the Nondescripts only Mr. Hannay and Mr. Macray gave trouble. The former played excellent cricket while he was compiling his seventy.

The worst match of the season was played against Dewars' C.C. on July 7th. Mackenzie made a good score for Dewars' Club, but only Mr. Stewart and Mr. Auden made runs

against them out of six of the team.

The return match with the Nondescripts was played on July 14th. With fifteen from Mr. Macray, thirty-two from Grahame, and seventeen extras, besides other small scores, they totalled one hundred and one. Mr. Mair and Mr. Stewart began for the Academy. At thirty-six Mr. Macray dismissed Mr. Stewart for seventeen. When Mr. Auden joined Mr. Mair runs came fast, boundaries by both batsmen being numerous. Though bowling changes were resorted to, it was not till the score reached 97 that a separation was effected, when Mair was caught at square-leg after a good innings of 35. Strathairn did not give much trouble, but J. Forbes and Mr. Auden carried the score to 139 when the former put up one of Macray's and was caught by Mr. Walker. D. Forbes left second ball, and Griffin joined Mr. Auden. The latter was run out after a period extending to almost two hours at the wickets. He had played a grand innings of 82, cutting and driving finely. Griffin was out for 7, but on Robertson joining Mr. Anderson another very serviceable stand was made. They collared the bowling and sent it all over the field. Immediately after the second century was hoisted, however, Judge bowled Robertson who had a good 21 opposite his name. None of the rest who succeeded managed to keep very long company with Mr. Anderson, who carried out his bat for a well played 31. The total which reached 227, or 126 above their opponents, is a record one for the Academy.
